PUBLIC HEARINGS

29. Adopt Proposed Rule 1155 - Particulate Matter Control Devices

MOVED BY YATES, SECONDED BY CAMPBELL, AND UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED (Absent: Cacciotti, Loveridge, Perry, and Reyes Uranga) THE PUBLIC HEARING ON PROPOSED RULE 1155 WAS CONTINUED TO THE DECEMBER 4, 2009 BOARD MEETING, AS RECOMMENDED BY STAFF.

30. Amend Rule 1111 - NOx Emissions from Natural-Gas-Fired, Fan-Type Central Furnaces

Joe Cassmassi, Planning and Rules Manager, gave the staff presentation. In addition to certifying the CEQA document and amending Rule 1111 as proposed, staff recommended allocation of \$3,000,000 for the early compliance program and \$1,000,000 for the technology compliance studies. Staff introduced an errata sheet that would add language to the Board's resolution directing the staff, as part of the technology assessment, to evaluate an alternative compliance option that staff would bring back to the Board in 2013. Copies of the errata sheet were distributed to Board members and made available to the public.

Mayor Pulido asked staff to consider increasing the differential in the cost incentives for early compliance between the standard efficiency and high efficiency units, quantifying the carbon reduction offsets resulting from the high efficiency units, and to keep in mind the alternatives that may develop from the rapid technological advances that are occurring.

Mr. Cassmassi responded that in discussion with The Gas Company and comments from the environmental community, staff has considered including an additional tier for the high efficiency units.

Supervisor Campbell asked staff to clarify who has access to the \$1,000,000 for research and how the AQMD would partner with them if a patentable product is developed. Dr. Wallerstein explained that staff would be bringing an RFP to the Board for approval. Staff will meet with industry on the patent issue, and bring that option to the Board at the time of RFP approval.

Dr. Lyou asked staff where the monies for the technology development would be coming from, and whether or not the funds could be directed at developing the higher efficiency units. Additionally, Dr. Lyou asked about implementing a mitigation fee to help reduce the cost of these units for low-income or fixed-income people; and suggested that might be appropriate for consideration when staff brings back the technology assessment in 2013.

Dr. Wallerstein responded that the monies came from mitigation fees imposed on the water heater industry, which incurred a similar rule amendment several years ago. Dr. Wallerstein also explained that staff would explore the feasibility of the funds being directed at the higher efficiency units; however, since the technology is still being developed for both the standard and the high efficiency units, staff will continue to research and make a determination at a later date.

(Cacciotti and Reyes Uranga arrived at 9:15 a.m., during the staff presentation)

The public hearing was opened and the following individuals addressed the Board to speak on Agenda Item No. 30.

MORGAN WYENN, Natural Resources Defense Council

Expressed support for PAR 1111, and urged the Board's approval as recommended. Noted her concerns, however, that the rule be structured to utilize a greater energy efficiency. Suggested that the technology development funds be granted to bolster energy efficiency as well as to reduce NOx emissions; and that the early compliance incentive funds should be used in a tiered approach, with less funds for the standard efficiency units and more funds being given for the high efficiency units. (Submitted written comments)

DAN McGIVNEY and LEE WALLACE, Southern California Gas Company (SoCal Gas) and San Diego Gas and Electric (SDG&E)

Expressed support for PAR 1111, noting that: (i) development and field testing of new low NOx burner technology would be challenging, especially for high efficiency residential furnaces; (ii) the proposed amended rule's early compliance incentive funds and funding for technology development may be necessary for manufacturers to develop higher efficiency units here, which generally cost \$500 to \$750 more than the less efficient units; and (iii) the proposed compliance schedule is the minimum time needed to research and develop rule compliant high efficiency furnaces as proposed by staff.

(Submitted written comments)

In response to Board Members' questions, Mr. McGivney indicated that (i) SoCal Gas and SDG&E did support the incentive program, including supporting a higher incentive amount for high efficiency units; (ii) SoCal Gas would more likely be an additional funder for these types of projects; and (iii) there could be a requirement under the technology assessment to evaluate different Btu gases and report their impacts.

Mr. Wallace stated that they have requested that the entire range of gases available in Southern California be tested and certified; not only for residential furnaces, but for all certifications being done.

FRANK STANONIK, Air Conditioning, Heating and Refrigeration Institute (AHRI)

Noted the concern they have expressed throughout the rulemaking process for PAR 1111 that the technologies to be applied to residential gas furnaces to reduce NOx emission to the level proposed in amended Rule 1111 have not been identified; and expressed their belief that conducting research and finding a commercially available technology would be best. However, District staff has modified proposed amended Rule 1111 to add provisions that respond to their concerns; and they support the addition of the technology assessment and the incentive of \$1,000,000 for research development. In view of these changes, they do not oppose the adoption of proposed amended Rule 1111. Requested that the alternative compliance mitigation fee option be added back into the rule, noting that the provision does not change the rule, but provides a reasonable backup if problems occur in the developing of compliant furnaces.

(Submitted written comments)

There being no further public testimony on this item, the public hearing was closed.

Adriano Martinez, Natural Resource Defense Council Martin Schlageter, Coalition for Clean Air

Dr. Wallerstein commented that while the RFP is being developed, staff could contact SoCal Gas and the PUC with regard to obtaining matching funds. Regarding the last request, to see how the technology develops, he indicated, as noted in the errata sheet, staff is committed to coming back to the Board prior to actual implementation of the limits; and, if the technology assessment warrants, a mitigation fee may be proposed for the Board's consideration for approval or disapproval at that time.

MOVED BY CAMPBELL. SECONDED BY CACCIOTTI. AND UNANIMOUSLY CARRIED THE (Absent: Loveridge and Perry), BOARD APPROVED AGENDA ITEM 30. RECOMMENDED BY STAFF, INCLUDING THE MODIFICATION TO THE RESOLUTION AS SET FORTH IN THE ERRATA SHEET AND NOTED **BELOW:**

- ADOPTING RESOLUTION NO. 09-24, AMENDING RULE 1111 AND CERTIFYING THE FEA; AND
- 2) ALLOCATING UP TO \$4,000,000 FROM FUND 27, AIR QUALITY INVESTMENT FUND:
 - A. \$3,000,000 for early compliance with Rule 1111 emission limits, and
 - B. \$1,000,000 for technology contracts in support of Rule 1111.

Addition to Resolution:

"WHEREAS, the AQMD Governing Board directs staff to evaluate as part of the technology assessment in proposed Amended Rule 1111 – NOx Emissions from Natural-Gas-Fired, Fan-Type Central Furnaces, an alternative compliance option that would allow manufacturers to delay compliance with the 14ng/Joule limit for up to three years and require the payment of mitigation fees; and"

31. Request to Revise 8-Hour Ozone and PM2.5 Transportation Conformity Emission Budgets for South Coast Air Basin and Coachella Valley

This item was withdrawn by staff.

<u>PUBLIC COMMENT PERIOD</u> – (Public Comment on Non-Agenda Items, Pursuant to Government Code Section 54954.3)

Mr. Frank Stanonik, with AHRI, commented that significant changes are taking place in regards to efficiency in furnaces; most significantly, in the area of condensing furnaces. Energy advocates will be going to Congress and the Department of Energy to set new minimum efficiency standards, which could affect new residential buildings in California. He suggested that more information be gathered before staff gets too involved in using emissions regulations to drive efficiency.

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Supervisor Campbell announced that the Caterpiller Tractor Company has developed an electric powered D7 that is being displayed at various landfill sites in Orange County. He invited any interested Board members to attend a demonstration on November 17, 2009, at 3:30 p.m., at the landfill adjacent to the City of Brea.
